
EMMA C TABOR

Printmaking and drawing



My work explores visual perceptions through the development of lines and patterns. My drawings grow from initial starting points and develop as they grow finding their own unique forms. They are part of a developing process rather than a representation of any identifiable form; I leave it to the viewer to decide what is happening as everyone will see them differently.

As well as screenprinting I have recently been exploring the scope of digital printmaking. Applying a similar process to hand-drawing I use the computer to explore relationships in colour and pattern. Each process allows me to examine these relationships in slightly different ways and form new visual interpretations.

Drawing



Last year I decided to create a drawing each day on a 5cm square of paper. In February of this year, I completed 365 days – but not quite as I had imagined...!

I wanted to see what would happen if I got into the habit of creating rather than of not creating (which had been my norm for quite a while). Many of the drawings were made in 30 seconds with no prep or planning. It has been a wonderful, mysterious experience. And it feels great to be creating – regardless of whether I like the results (or not)!

This work is part of my project 'Creating Practice / Practice Creating' which includes drawings in a variety of materials, an artist's book, photographs and videos.

Mixed media collage



I use painted paper to create images. These may be a found landscape within a single painted sheet of paper, or a selection of parts of several different sheets combined in a collage to create a semi abstract landscape.

I have found the painting very liberating - freely spreading a mixture of colours on large sheets of paper with a palette knife. The end results are not a faithful recording of particular places but create themselves from the different elements within the painted papers.

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
